As we continue enhancing services and infrastructure across Monmouth County, we are excited to share updates on transportation improvements, record-breaking tourism revenue, cost-saving shared services, and critical infrastructure investments. These initiatives reflect our commitment to strengthening County resources and ensuring a high quality of life for our residents.

On behalf of the Monmouth County Board of County Commissioners, I had the privilege of delivering the State of the County address, highlighting our 2024 accomplishments and vision for 2025. It was an opportunity to reflect on progress and outline plans to further enhance public services, economic growth, and community well-being.

## Ride in Monmouth: Enhancing Transportation Services

The Monmouth County Division of Transportation is proud to introduce Ride in Monmouth, formerly known as SCAT, along with the Wellness Transportation Program. These services provide essential transportation for seniors, individuals with disabilities, and residents in rural areas.

All medical trips, including life-sustaining treatments, will now be offered at no charge. Veterans and those participating in sponsored grocery trips also receive free transportation. Non-sponsored grocery trips and other transportation services are available at \$2.00 each way. These curbside services operate Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., on a first-come, first-served basis. To schedule a ride, call 732-431-6480.

Launched in October 2022, the Brewed & Distilled in Monmouth program was created to identify and promote local craft beverage businesses, such as breweries, wineries, distilleries, and meaderies.

Additionally, I am excited to introduce Slice in Monmouth, a new initiative aimed at promoting and supporting local pizzerias across the County.

Recognizing that pizzerias are an essential part of Monmouth County's culinary and small business landscape, this program is designed to boost visibility, encourage community engagement, and drive economic growth for these beloved establishments. ## Securing Federal and State Funding for Infrastructure

The Monmouth County Division of Engineering remains focused on improving roads and bridges. To ease the financial burden on taxpayers, we have secured more than \$7 million in federal funding for the Preliminary Engineering Phases of two major bridge replacements:

- The Oceanic Bridge (S-31) over the Navesink River, connecting Middletown and Rumson.
- Bridge O-12 on Corlies Avenue over Deal Lake, serving Allenhurst and Ocean Township.

We will continue working to secure additional funding to advance these essential infrastructure projects.

## Stormwater Filtration System Maintenance

Monmouth County is committed to improving stormwater quality by integrating filtration systems into all new bridge structures. These systems help remove pollutants from runoff and prevent flooding.

The Bridge Division is mapping existing systems and developing maintenance schedules to ensure they function efficiently before and after storm events. This initiative enhances water quality across the County.

## Supporting Emergency Services Through Our Fleet Program

Our Division of Fleet Services supports 114 municipal entities under the Shared Services program, ensuring County vehicles, including those in the new Med-Star ambulance program, are well-maintained and reliable.

By keeping emergency and municipal fleets in top condition, we continue to enhance safety and efficiency in Monmouth County.

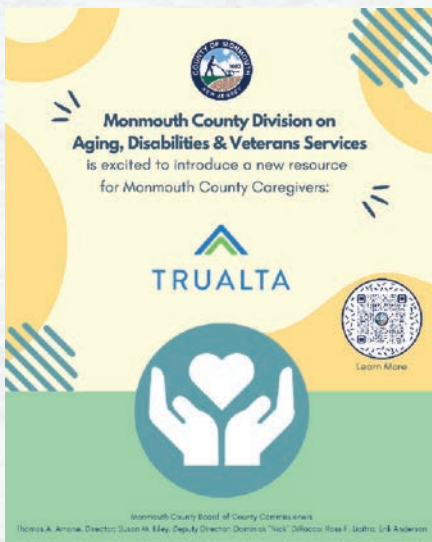
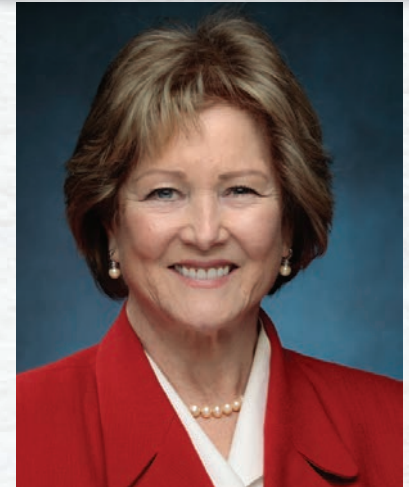

# Commissioner Deputy Director Susan M. Kiley

It's easy to see how well our roads and bridges are kept, how our parks are so beautifully maintained and how well our libraries are run, but it's not always easy to see the impact of the work we do behind the scenes to maintain the personal health and lives of our constituents. As the liaison to the Monmouth County Department of Health and Human Services, it is my mission to make sure we are providing every possible service we can to assist with our residents' needs – and to make sure our residents have access to them.

In February 2024, we launched our Monmouth ACTS Navigation System, the first of its kind in New Jersey, which has an electronic referral and tracking system so we can capture real data to show how our efforts are impacting our residents. This initiative continues to offer a streamlined way for residents to connect with resources including food, housing, childcare, mental health support and more. Since its launch, more than 3,400 residents have been helped through this service.

Our Monmouth ACTS in My Community program is another initiative where we get out into the community and see who needs our help. This program places representatives from the Division of Social Services directly in the offices of community-based organizations and nonprofits, making it easier for residents to connect to much needed programs such as SNAP, TANF and Medicaid without having to come to County offices. I am proud to report that in 2024, 3,866 residents were served directly in their local community through this initiative.



The Office on Aging, part of the Division on Aging, Disabilities and Veterans Services, is celebrating 50 years of service to Monmouth County seniors and their caregivers with a new FREE program to assist Monmouth County's caregivers. TRUALTA is a comprehensive online learning library specifically designed for unpaid family caregivers. Accessible 24/7, it offers articles, training videos, support groups and local resources – all curated to meet the needs of caregivers. # Commissioner Dominick “Nick” DiRocco



**F**ire safety and prevention are essential to protecting the health, safety and welfare of the residents of Monmouth County. As the Commissioner Liaison to the Monmouth County Fire Marshal's Office and the Monmouth County Fire Academy, I am grateful for the opportunity to work alongside Fire Marshal Fred Migliaccio to ensure the safety of our citizens. Fred Migliaccio is a career public safety official who serves as the Director of Fire Services, Fire Marshal, and Chief Fire Coordinator, and acts in an advisory capacity to all fire service organizations throughout Monmouth County.

Under Fire Marshal Migliaccio's leadership, the County Fire Marshal's Office is tasked with implementing public fire prevention measures, conducting fire investigations, and enforcing fire codes. Critical aspects of the role include fire prevention education through public outreach programs and assistance to municipal fire departments. In the last two years alone, the County's fire service personnel have responded to over 500 incidents. The Fire Marshal's Office also provides specialized fire safety education for children and teens, thereby helping to reduce incidents of injury, property loss and death.

In addition to these critically important functions, the County Fire Marshal's Office also provides mutual assistance to all of Monmouth County's municipalities and coordinates mutual aid plans. Moreover, the Office maintains a firefighting apparatus inventory for all Monmouth County Fire Departments and Task Forces, including the Structural Firefighting Task Force, the Wildland Urban Interface Protection Task Force, the Large Diameter Hose Task Force, the Marine Task Force, the Tanker Task Force, and the Monmouth County Urban Search and Rescue Team.



Alongside tactical and operational fire services, Fire Marshal Migliaccio also oversees the Monmouth County Fire Academy, which serves as a vital institution for training future and mid-career firefighters and emergency responders, equipping them with the knowledge and skills necessary to handle fire-related emergencies effectively. The Fire Academy is dedicated to the safety, survival and well-being of the firefighters of Monmouth County and provides cutting-edge, full-contact fire service training through a standardized curriculum developed and implemented to ensure excellence in firefighting for the protection of the citizens of Monmouth County and beyond.

The Fire Academy provides instruction and training for Firefighter I, Firefighter II, Fire Officer I, Fire Officer II, and Junior Firefighters to create an ongoing pool of human resources for fire departments throughout the County. The Academy also provides annual updates and training in a variety of important areas, including HAZMAT, Bloodborne Pathogens, SCBA Recertification, Advanced SCBA, Incident Command, Incident Safety, Fire Police, and Resiliency. In 2024, the Monmouth County Fire Academy trained approximately 1,000 people in all classes and graduated 74 individuals from the Firefighter I and Firefighter II programs.

Together, the Fire Marshal's Office and Fire Academy play an indispensable role in safeguarding Monmouth County. By educating the public about fire safety, enforcing fire safety regulations, responding to fire incidents and providing necessary training to firefighters, these offices are critical to preventing disasters and ensuring a swift, effective response when emergencies do arise. The important work being performed by these agencies creates a safer environment for all, underscoring the importance of fire education, prevention, and preparedness.

Thank you to the staff at the County Fire Marshal's Office and the Fire Academy for your important work. I am honored to be your Commissioner Liaison and thank you to our residents for your support.

# Commissioner Ross F. Licitra

Three months into 2025, the Board of County Commissioners and my office have hit the ground running. We have been actively engaged in meetings, planning, listening to our constituents, grand openings, celebrating milestones and participating in various events. Here's a quick recap of the past few months and some exciting plans for the near future.

I want to share a resolution that I proposed to my fellow board members in support of New Jersey Senate Bill 4048 and Assembly Bill 1298. Senate Bill 4048 prohibits counties and municipalities from approving the construction of certain warehouses on land located within 1,000 feet of a historic district. And Assembly Bill 1298 establishes a grant program within the Department of State to support the preservation of specific Revolutionary War sites.

I am passionate about and dedicated to protecting and preserving our land and open spaces, maintaining the rural integrity of Monmouth County, and safeguarding our rich history.



We are fortunate in Monmouth County to have access to many beautiful parks and more than 18,000 acres of parklands that can be enjoyed year-round. This winter season, our parks were filled with visitors participating in a variety of winter activities, such as sledding at Holmdel Park, skiing at Thompson Park, and ice skating and ice fishing at Holmdel Park, Shark River Park, Turkey Swamp Park and the Manasquan Reservoir.

As the ice begins to defrost and we enter the spring season, activities and programs at the parks ramp up even more! Take advantage of all the Monmouth County Park System has to offer; golf, tennis and pickleball lessons, equestrian, hiking, archery, yoga,

The Preservation Grants are funded by Monmouth County and help support municipalities and nonprofit organizations by providing matching funds for restoration projects of historic structures. The History Re-grant program supports local historical organizations and nonprofits with annual operations as well as special project funding.

# Administrator Teri O'Connor

This year's winter weather proved to be cold, wet, and challenging but Monmouth County was ready. As a matter of fact, Monmouth County was designated a "Storm Ready" county by the National Weather Service. This designation demonstrates that the County has established reliable weather monitoring, emergency communication systems, and resources are in place in case of a natural disaster. Congratulations to the Monmouth County Sheriff's Office of Emergency Management.

The County sponsored its second annual Snowplow Naming Contest, which was open to all Monmouth County 5th graders. Students who submitted their letters suggested names for a County snowplow and wrote about how to stay safe during a storm. This year, the two winning entries, selected from 230 submissions, suggested the same name, "Born to Plow." Congratulations to Jackson Mattioli of the Laura Donovan Elementary School in Freehold Township and Jackson Felegy of the Middletown Village Elementary School in Middletown.



We have officially "sprung forward" with our clocks and also experienced the first sunset after 6:00 p.m. since last October. The County is moving forward as well. We are in the process of finalizing our 2025 budget, always prioritizing our taxpayers. We continue to expand vital services such as MedStar while trimming costs where feasible. An example of cost savings would be cyber security insurance. The primary focus of insurance carriers when assessing cyber security premiums is training. I am proud to say that every Monmouth County employee who has access to a computer is required to successfully complete a cyber security training session. Instituting programs like this leads to savings for our taxpayers.

The County, through the Parks Department, has partnered with the nonprofit, First Tee, to bring the golf experience to children who wouldn't otherwise have the opportunity. Programs will begin at the Wolf Hill Recreation Area in Oceanport this Fall with additional improvements to follow. We are excited about this initiative and will provide updates throughout the project.

The Monmouth County Vocational School District (MCVSD) continues to shine. According to *U.S. News and World Report* for 2024:

- High Technology High School was ranked as the No. 1 high school in New Jersey and No. 24 nationally;
- Biotechnology High School was ranked No. 5 in New Jersey and No. 72 nationally;
- The Marine Academy of Science and Technology was ranked No. 12 in New Jersey and No. 207 nationally;
- The Monmouth County Academy of Allied Health and Science was ranked No. 16 in New Jersey and No. 323 nationally
- And Communications High School was ranked No. 34 in New Jersey and No. 645 nationally.

The County's Department of Facilities Management and Division of Fleet Services offered internships to MCVSD students this past year, resulting in the hiring of four graduates into full-time roles with the County.

A ground-breaking collaborative effort among the MCVSD, the County college, Brookdale Community College, and Kean University will launch a nursing pathway program, Nursing Bridge to Excellence in Fall 2025. Students will start their academic journey at the MCVSD and transition through Brookdale to Kean to earn their BSN.

With the introduction of AI Search and AI Voice Assistants, we have made significant strides in enhancing our services to better support our community. Our primary goal, especially for those facing the difficult journey of loss, is to offer assistance 24 hours a day, seven days a week. We want you to feel assured that help is available whenever needed.

Our AI tools enable residents to ask questions about probate, guardianship and adoption processes anytime. For instance, if you have questions about probate, you can contact our office after hours or on weekends when we are closed. With the help of AI, assistance is always readily available, ensuring that residents receive the information they need. Furthermore, our AI systems offer communication in more than 100 languages.

Alongside this new technology, our online eFile system, launched last year, has seen great success. We facilitated more than 750 probate filings last year, representing 14% of all probate cases. This convenient tool allows you to securely upload documents and file your probate and estate matters from the comfort of your home.

## Prosecutor Raymond S. Santiago



The Monmouth County Prosecutor's Office has launched a wide-ranging fraud prevention initiative, with a particular emphasis on addressing schemes or frauds that target seniors.

Key features of the initiative include members of the Financial Crimes and Special Prosecutions Unit working directly with municipal police departments to plan and host in-person informational sessions at local senior centers; one of these sessions will be recorded and made available for further dissemination to additional sites.

Hard copies of informational pamphlets and a multi-page guide outlining some common types of scams have also been produced and are being distributed with the assistance of those partner agencies.

"A fundamental element of our primary mission as law enforcement entails doing everything in our power to protect our residents from being targeted as victims of crime," Monmouth County Prosecutor Raymond S. Santiago said. "There are few things more emblematic of this notion than bad actors acting with the intent of stealing from our residents, especially our seniors, many of whom are often already on a fixed income. One of the most effective tools to combat such conduct is education. Sadly, criminals have used advances in technology to benefit themselves at the cost of all of us now needing to second-guess all communications received."
