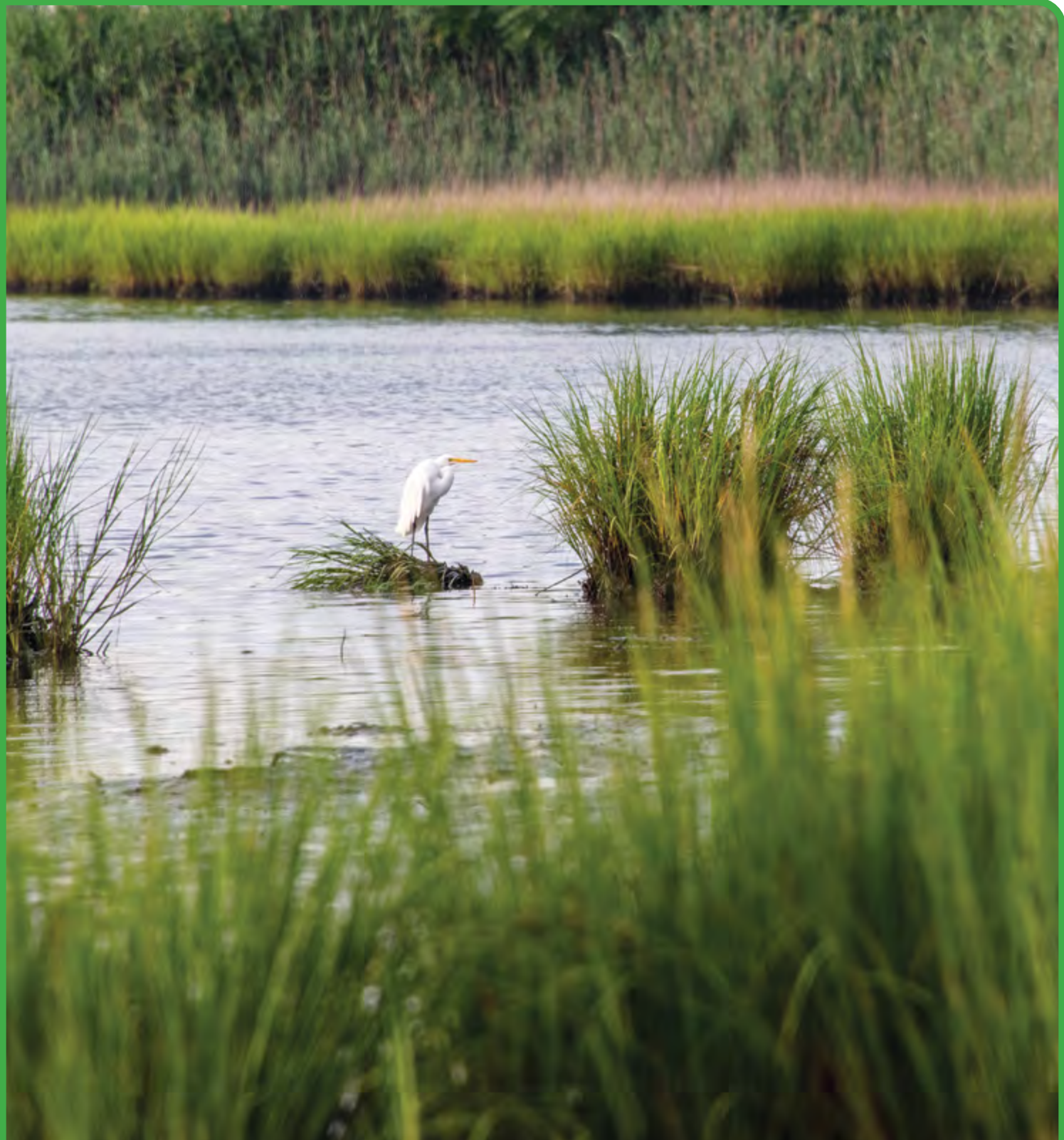

Awards

■ Preservation NJ 2025 Preservation Project Award - Historic Racing Stable

- The Historic Preservation Award recognized the Park System's historic preservation staff including recently retired Supervising Historic Preservation Specialist Gail Hunton, for her strategic role in the preservation of the Historic Racing Stable. The award also recognized the architects, general contractor, and Park System exhibition team, Kristen Hohn, Reagan Miller, Dorothy Reilly, and Michael Alfano, graphic designer, for their extraordinary work preserving and restoring a local landmark and creating and designing exhibits that interpret the site's stories and historic significance.



■ Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) "Historic Preservation Medal" awarded to Historic Preservation staff

- The Monmouth County Park System's Historic Preservation staff was awarded the Daughters of the American Revolution (DAR) "Historic Preservation Medal" in recognition of its ongoing dedication to the preservation, restoration, and rehabilitation of the Park System's many National Register listed historic sites and districts. The award also acknowledged the Park System's commitment to cemetery preservation and our continued partnership with the Middletown DAR chapter on collaborative projects such as the interpretive wayside panel at Bayshore Waterfront Park detailing the Capture of the Brigantine Britannia, the monument ceremony at the Browns Dock Road burial ground in Huber Woods celebrating Revolutionary War Patriot, Corporal Henry Johnson, and upcoming interpretive initiatives celebrating Monmouth County's 250th anniversary.



Park Accomplishments

■ Braille Trail at Manasquan Reservoir

- The Park System proudly announced the opening of the Manasquan Reservoir

Environmental Center Braille Trail, developed to be inclusive for people of all abilities, with an emphasis on those with visual impairments. A guide rope leads visitors along the trail and links information panels that feature braille translations of the text along with tactile elements. An optional audio tour using GPS and powered by the VoiceMap app is also available for users. This fantastic new element to the park was made possible by the generous support of the Colts Neck Lions Club and the Friends of the Monmouth County Park System.

■ Coordinated the planting of 691 shrubs and trees throughout the Park System

■ Issued Research and Collections Permits to 23 researchers from conservation agencies, universities, and nonprofits

- The Natural Resources Department of the Monmouth County Park System issues permits for scientific research and collections within the parks. The mission is to preserve and enhance lands for the purposes of resource and habitat protection and preserve and enhance lands for the recreation and enjoyment of citizens whilst maintaining the balance between those two goals.

Visitor Services Accomplishments

■ In 2025, Monmouth County Park System camps achieved American Camp Association (ACA) accreditation, providing clear evidence of our dedication to health, safety, and the highest standards of camp excellence. The rigorous accreditation process required compliance with 144 ACA standards and provided a valuable opportunity to evaluate and strengthen our camp operations.

As a result, policies and procedures were strengthened and standardized to support consistent, high-quality camp operations. The accreditation process required expanded staff training in safety, policies, procedures, organizational goals, expectations, and skills verification, resulting in a more knowledgeable, professional, and higher-quality staff.

This achievement was made possible through the collaborative efforts of staff across Operations, Golf, Visitor Services, and Administration. Together, these teams designed and delivered outstanding camp experiences, maintained facilities to the highest standards, assembled comprehensive documentation, and welcomed accreditation visitors with professionalism and hospitality ensuring a successful outcome for the Monmouth County Park System.

■ 2025 was another highly successful year for Visitor Services. Program attendance and revenue remained strong, and we once again surpassed the previous year's revenue. The continued popularity of our programs reflects the community's confidence in our services and confirms that we consistently meet and often exceed participant expectations.

■ Community Recreation launched a camp scholarship referral program with Monmouth County Human Services, resulting in dozens of referrals and two camper registrations in its first year. Growing awareness of the program led to an invitation to present at the Retired Teachers Association of New Jersey's annual luncheon, where a \$750 donation was made to support the initiative.

■ **Senior Hikers** recorded **854 total registrations** across five special hike days and seven weekly hikes. Special spring and fall hikes filled, demonstrating strong interest for expanded offerings in 2026.

Land Acquisition

A total of 777 new acres were added to park properties in 2025. The Monmouth County Park System now owns/manages 19,672 acres throughout 44 park areas and golf courses across the county. In 2025, the Park System continued to make progress towards the attainment of Monmouth County's long-range open space goal of 21,000 acres preserved of public park and recreation purposes.

Founded in 1991, The Friends of the Parks, a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, facilitates sponsorship and hosts fundraising events and activities to raise money for special projects in the parks.

In 2025, special projects funded by The Friends included renovations to the Carriage House at Historic Portland Place, historic costumes for staff at Historic Longstreet Farm, and the purchase of artifacts and exhibit items for the Park System's collection. Additionally, in partnership with the Colts Neck Lions Club, the Braille Trail opened at the Manasquan Reservoir. This first-of-a-kind endeavor features an interactive trail exhibit with cast bronze wayside exhibits, Braille descriptions, and an audio narration. The New Jersey Recreation and Parks Association (NJRPA) selected the Braille Trail as the winner of their 2025 Excellence in Design Award.

During the year, The Friends placed a total of 26 memorial benches in the following Park System sites: Deep Cut Gardens, Dorbrook Recreation Area, Fisherman's Cove Conservation Area, Hartshorne Woods Park, Henry Hudson Trail, Holmdel Park, Hominy Hill Golf Course, Huber Woods Park, Swimming River Park, Thompson Park, and Turkey Swamp Park. In addition, The Friends continued to provide recreation assistance funding for camp scholarships, after-school programs, and park excursions for the Urban Recreation and Community Recreation Divisions. Funding was also provided for outdoor recreation programs, volunteer programs, and therapeutic recreation programs, as well as for advanced education and training seminars and courses for Park System staff.

The Friends are proud to provide this support for the Monmouth County Park System.

SPUR



Special People United to Ride (SPUR) is a nonprofit organization that supports adaptive horseback riding and equestrian programs at Sunnyside Equestrian Center. During 2025 the Equestrian Center offered many programs with an average of over 100 SPUR riders per session. The Equine facilitated Learning program for school groups along with youth horseback riding was also offered

in 2025. Hosting four volunteer workshops throughout the year SPUR added 40 new volunteers to the program. We also hosted a Halloween celebration including live music and a sing along for all the participants. We hosted the 2025 SPUR horse show for over 75 riders, and the Holiday party "Breakfast with Santa" for SPUR families and participants. 2025 was a successful year being able to provide these special programs for our community. www.spuronline.org

Established in 1977, Monmouth Conservation Foundation (MCF) works to acquire and preserve open space and farmland and conserve natural habitats throughout Monmouth County in support of outdoor recreation, agriculture, clean water, and wildlife for long-term sustainability. The independent nonprofit's vision is to lead conservation and education efforts to preserve

and protect our natural environment, so all individuals and communities have access to and can benefit from open space and nature for generations to come. MCF is proud to have assisted with the preservation of more than 4,400 acres of County parklands - 24% of MCPS' total acreage - and nearly 9,700 acres overall in Monmouth County to date. In addition, MCF responsibly and consistently oversees the protection of critical natural resources on approximately 900 acres of preserved lands through conservation and agricultural easements. It is one of 478 accredited land trusts out of 1,281 nationwide. Jointly, MCF and Monmouth County are working to expand and enhance parklands to ensure that the County remains a highly desirable place for people and natural inhabitants. www.monmouthconservation.org

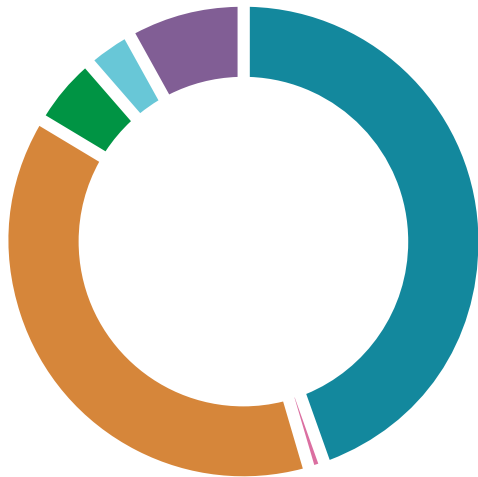
