THANKSGIVING FOR THE GIFTS OF 4-H

Today, youth and their families have many youth serving organizations and activities to select from; 4-H continues to be their central choice. What makes 4-H the dynamic youth development program which attracts more than 7 million youth nationwide from diverse ethnic, racial and socioeconomic backgrounds in rural, suburban and urban communities? What does 4-H offer which makes youth choose 4-H above so many other options?

>Inclusiveness-Youth feel a sense of belonging for each is respected as an individual with unique skills and interests. 4-H'ers frequently say that they find in 4-H a place in which they can be fully themselves.

>Non-competitiveness– Many youth programs are characterized by a competitiveness which can erode self image in youth who are not selected as “the chosen”. In 4-H, all youth are recognized and celebrated for their endeavors, thus leading to an increase in self-esteem. 4-H'ers each work to the best of their abilities “to make the best better”.

>Variety of opportunities– While most youth organizations offer specific programs (e.g., camp, after school), 4-H offers a broad spectrum of activities in which 4-H'ers can participate (e.g., club, independent project, after school program, camp, school enrichment, special interest). This enables youth to access 4-H at their own desired level of involvement. Some 4-H'ers may participate in only one of these delivery modes; others in more than one. Often, participation in one 4-H activity may lead to further involvement in other 4-H activities; for instance, a camper may later join a 4-H club.

>Opportunity to participate at progressive levels on the county, state and national levels.

>4-H is unique in that it provides opportunities for youth, if they so choose, to progress from county, to state to national level participation. Examples of these options include County Public Presentations, South Jersey Teen Conference and National 4-H Congress.

>Option for short or long term involvement - It is the opportunity for lifelong involvement which makes 4-H unique from other youth organizations. If a 4-Her so chooses, it is possible for him or her to remain active in 4-H from first grade through high school, perhaps becoming active as an alumni member or club leader. Or he or she can remain involved on a short term basis. Whatever the choice, for all 4-Hers, 4-H remains throughout their lives a strong foundation of friendship, skill development and self-esteem.

Happy Thanksgiving, 4-H – thank you to all who make 4-H a reality in the lives of our youth.

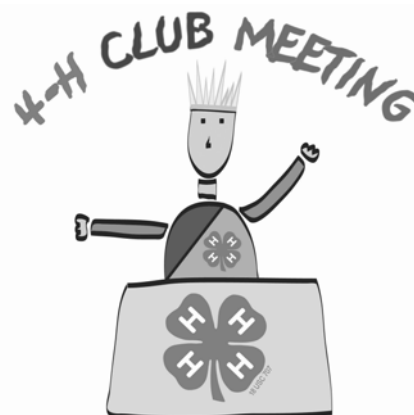
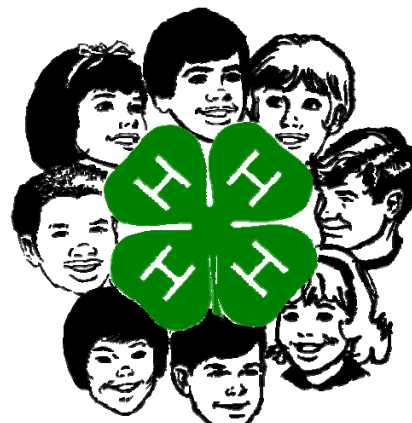

LAKE TOPANEMUS

This quaint little lake is tucked away from the bustling activity of Route 9, just north of Freehold. Large oak and maple provide dense shade in the picnic and launch area, where a few lakeside benches invite you to sit and enjoy the scenery. A hiking trail leading from the east end of the parking area takes you through the woods and around most of the lake.

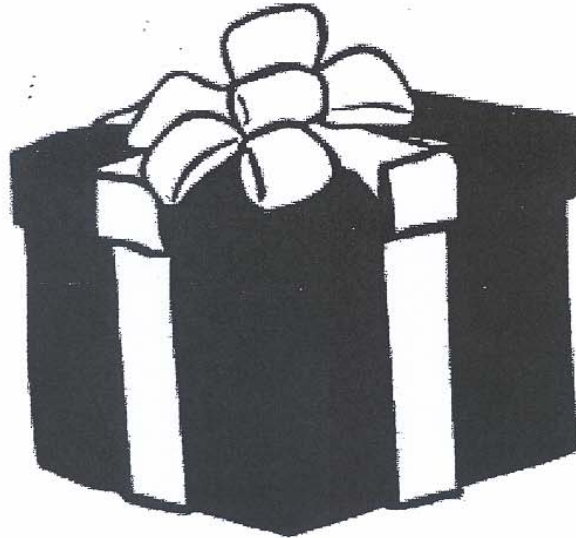

PROJECT EAT

Project EAT is a program administered by Volunteers in Public Service in partnership with the United Way of Monmouth County, the Asbury Park Press, GPU Energy (formerly JCP&L). Created in 1969 by the Monmouth County Division of Social Services, Volunteers in Public Service was the first public human service agency in New Jersey to bring together the diverse talents and interests of Monmouth County citizens to augment, extend and enrich government programs. Today over 700 Volunteers in Public Service of all ages are working to enrich the lives of others as well as their own. They are caring and concerned persons who are helping to identify unmet needs and innovate new approaches to human problems.

What is Project EAT (Everyone Ate Today)

Project EAT is a food collection program in which schools, businesses, corporations, organizations and places of worship collect food each month to help their local food pantries feed hungry families. There are 45 food pantries in Monmouth County struggling to feed all those who come to them for help. Lost jobs as well as low paying jobs are making it harder than ever for families to buy essential food items. As a result there are many families in our communities today who go hungry.

What Happens to People Who Go Hungry

The effects of hunger are devastating. Poor nutrition is especially hard on children who are more likely to experience headaches, fatigue, excessive colds and other illnesses. They have more frequent absences from school and are at risk of dropping out. Hungry children are often less physically active, less attentive and may suffer permanently impaired verbal and motor skills as well as reading difficulties. Adults who are hungry often become nervous, irritable and are unable to concentrate. They may also develop weak bones and muscles, suffer increased illnesses, depression and lack of energy. And undernourished women who are pregnant risk having babies with low birth weights, more physical illnesses and greater development and learning problems.

What You Can Do to Make a Difference

You can start Project EAT at your workplace, school (K-12), college, organization, or place of worship. It is amazing how much difference a single group can make if each does a small part. Through Project EAT you can help feed the hungry in your community.

What We will Do to Help

Volunteers in Public Service will provide :

- presentations to introduce Project EAT
- individual consultation to help your group get started
- Linkage to your local food pantry
- A periodic newsletter with Project EAT updates and creative ideas for collecting needed food items
- A Project EAT How-to-Guide for schools—developed and printed for us by the Asbury Park Press
- A curriculum dealing with the problem of hunger for use in classes K-12
- A video produced by students, faculty and parents at the Southard School in Howell showing how Project EAT works in their school
- Award certificates to display in classrooms and other sites

Youth Incentive Award

The Coleopterists Society, an international organization of professionals and hobbyists interested in the study of beetles, has established a program to recognize young people studying beetles. The Society has pledged to provide up to \$300 each year for the Youth Incentive Award Program. In addition to monetary grants of \$150, award recipients will receive up to \$200 (Junior Award) and \$400 (Senior Award) of equipment credit from the [BioQuip Products](#) catalog. In addition to monetary grants of \$150, award recipients will receive a one year subscription to the society journal, *The Coleopterists Bulletin*. **This is for children of grades 7-12 only.**

The objectives of the Youth Incentive Award are to:

- * provide encouragement and assistance to young beetle enthusiasts (grades 7-12).
- * promote the study of beetles, the most diverse group of insects, as a rewarding lifelong avocation or career.
- * provide opportunities for young people to develop important life skills such as leadership, cooperation, communication, planning and conducting a scientific study, grant writing and managing funds.
- * provide some financial support to enrich activities or projects.

A Youth Incentive Award Committee from the Coleopterists Society will evaluate the applications and will select up to two winners annually; one each in junior (grades 7-9) and senior (grades 10-12) categories. The selection committee invites proposals for topics such as field collecting trips to conduct beetle species inventories or diversity studies, attending workshops or visiting entomology or natural history museums for special training and projects on beetles, studying aspects of beetle biology, etc. The proposed activities or projects will be evaluated on their degree of creativity, educational benefit to the applicant, scientific merit, feasibility and budgetary planning. This Award is for proposals by individuals only. Each applicant is strongly encouraged to find an adult advisor (teacher, youth group leader, parent, etc.) to provide guidance in proposal development, but the proposal **MUST** be written by the applicant. The Coleopterists Society would also be happy to assist in establishing contacts between youth and professional Coleopterists.

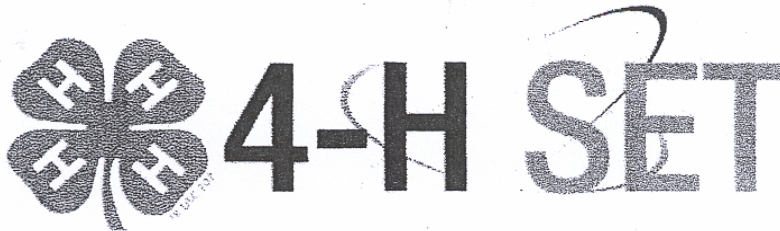
